### Green Plate Special

Have you been wondering what's behind the slowly evolving garden at MLK and East Union Streets? It is the work of a new non-profit called *Green Plate Special (GPS)*. Its mission is to engage middle school students in the growing and cooking of fresh, whole foods. The group was started by chef, Laura Dewell, and teacher, Libby Sinclair (a GMV resident for 35 years).

Starting in January, Green Plate Special (<u>www.greenplatespecial.org</u>) held work parties to clear the trash-strewn lot, stack re-usable materials, and construct a neighbor-friendly fence. With the ideas, guidance and service of middle and high school students in the Madrona/ Garfield and Madison Valley neighborhoods, you can see the transformation to a thriving garden taking place.

In addition to learning how to grow and cook food, Green Plate Special has also designed many intentional lessons in what is meant by *sustainability*.

- Many raised garden beds have been created with the remnants of the small building that once existed on the southwest corner of the property, and slabs of broken concrete.
- Untended fruit trees were pruned, wood was cut and stacked. Many raised beds are edged with this wood.
- Burlap coffee sacks free from coffee roasters, provide mulch, serve as planters, and cover hay bale seating.
- Hay bales are seating for now, planting medium in the future.
- Both of the umbrellas shading our worktables were retrieved from the trash and repaired.
- High school students from Ground Up Organics built compost bins from wood pallets destined for the landfill. *Cont'd on p. 7...*

# Our Back to School Issue!

**School is back in session in September,** so please remember that means more child pedestrians will be on the roads in our neighborhoods and in school zones. AAA of Washington reminds drivers to be "especially cautious and alert during the morning hours and afternoon hours." (Sept. 2011) Here are a few of tips from AAA to keep kids safe as they navigate through our neighborhood streets and school zones:

Follow the speed Limit — The speed limit for school zones in WA state is 20 mph and speed violations are double the normal fine!

**Look for AAA School Safety Patrollers** — They post more than 22,000 safety patrollers at 800 schools across WA, and are a sure sign you're approaching a school zone.

Come to a Complete Stop — at intersections with stop signs!

Always Stop for Loading / Unloading School Buses — Not stopping is dangerous and against the law!

**Eliminate Driver Distraction** — AAA research shows that taking your eyes off the road for *two seconds* doubles your chances of crashing. This is a sobering message for cell phone users!

**Plan Ahead** — Leave early for your destination and build in extra time for traffic congestion. Modify your route to avoid school zones and traffic hot-spots altogether.





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
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### Garbage 101

I recently had the opportunity to meet at SPU headquarters downtown with two representatives: Bret Stav and Andy Ryan. After my initial awe of the view from the top of the municipal building, I was able to get some answers to questions I receive from our community's citizens.

At a rate of 51%, Seattle is a national leader in recycling. Bret Stav feels that with the enthusiasm of residents, we could push that success rate up a few more points. Additionally, there is very little contamination of un-recyclables in the materials received — only about 5% of it is unclean. So, we are doing a great job.

Recycling trucks take their full loads down to 4th A venue where materials are dumped onto a giant conveyor belt. Personnel on both sides sort out unacceptable materials: dirty or loose plastic bags, lids smaller than 3 inches, and garbage, for example. There is no limit to the amount of recycling you can set out each week.

Although, we do not receive any charge on our SPU bills for recycling, it is not free to us. The cost of home recycling and hazard waste drop off centers are bundled into our regular garbage bills.

Speaking of the garbage: with expanded recycling, yard and kitchen waste disposal, there is very little being collected these days. A huge portion of the garbage is diapers and pet waste.

People often ask what ever happened to using our garbage disposals instead of recycling their kitchen scraps? The answer: "Rats, Rats, Rats", says Bret Stav. When you put food into the sewer system you are providing a tasty meal for our rat population, which is in the millions throughout the city. Inappropriate uses of compost piles are also open-air diners for the rats.

After finding it too expensive to buy a much-needed garden shed, GPS drew up its own plan and began *gleaning* for donations of scrap wood. In two weeks, wood headed to the landfill from private backyards, as well as from construction sites, was "harvested" with the help of kindly neighborhood truck owners and others. With this "throwaway" lumber, volunteers and students from the STAR TS program have built a beautiful garden shed, three benches, and four raised planting beds so far. **Green Plate Special will be having an Open House for the neighborhood on a Friday in September.** We are delighted to be a part of both the GMV and Madrona neighborhoods. We especially appreciate our volunteers and neighbors, and the passers -by who lean over the fence with a friendly thumbs-up or a question about what's growing.

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
