Today, with a student population over 250, King is a cheerful, busy place that attracts young families. Ms. Butler's positive relations with the community and neighboring Bush School helped he win this honor. A film of the award ceremony will be shown on KCTS 9 Thursday, February 26th at 8pm.

The school district makes quarterly assessments of student achievement in reading and math. King students have made improvements in reading levels. Bylaws of the Greater Madison Valley Community Council Second Revision Draft

To be voted on at February 17, 1998 General Meeting

<u>Article I. Name and Area Represented</u> The name of the organization is the Greater Madison Valley Community Council (GMVCC). We are incorporated as a non-profit group in Washington State. Our address is 2802 East Madison Street, Box 184, Seattle, Washington 98112. The area we represent is bounded on the north by East Helen Street, the west boundary of the Arboretum and East Madison Street; on the east by Lake Washington Boulevard; on the south by East Denny Way; and on the west by 23rd Avenue East.

<u>Article II. Purpose</u> Our purpose is to represent the residents of our neighborhood, to provide a democratic forum for all members, and to protect and advance the interests of the community before municipal, state, and federal agencies.

<u>Article III.</u> <u>Membership</u> All residents of our neighborhood designated in Article I shall be eligible for membership. The amount of any dues will be determined by membership vote.

Article IV. Meetings, Quorum, Voting The Council shall meet at least nine times a year. All Council meetings shall be open to the membership. Time and place of meetings shall be announced well in advance. A quorum for conducting any official business shall be twelve members in good standing. Each member shall have one vote. Business meetings shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order.

<u>Article V. Officers and Elections</u> The Council shall elect the following officers: a President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Co-officers may be chosen if the members wish. Terms of office shall be one year and officers may be re-elected. The responsibilities of these officers shall be defined from time to time as the Council decides. Nomination and election of officers shall take place at the May general meeting. Officers will assume their duties immediately. All records and documents must be passed on to the new officers before the meeting following the election.

<u>Article VI. Executive Committee or Board</u> There shall be an executive committee composed of the elected officers and heads of acting committees. Acting committees may be established from time to time by vote of the membership. The board, chaired by the President, may discuss policy and emerging problems and will do their business between regular membership meetings. Their actions shall serve the purposes of the Council as stated in Article II and must be reported to the general membership.

<u>Article VII. Participation in Area Councils</u> Greater Madison Valley Community Council shall send volunteer representatives to all appropriate city or district councils.

<u>Article VIII. Public Relations</u> The organization shall publish a newsletter regularly to inform members and the public at large of our activities.

<u>Article IX.</u> Adoption of Bylaws These bylaws shall be adopted by a two-thirds vote of members present and in good standing at a regular membership meeting at which a quorum of twelve is present.

<u>Article X. Amendment Process</u> Amendments to the bylaws may be proposed by majority vote at any general meeting. Proposed amendments must be published for the entire membership and voted on at the next regular meeting. Amendments must be ratified by a two-thirds vote of members present and in good standing.

The January meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM. A quorum of 12 members was present. Peggy Sussman volunteered to take minutes; Cathy Nunneley volunteered to bring refreshments for the next meetings. Thanks to Cathy for the refreshments for this meeting.

The minutes of the November meeting were distributed for comments, additions and corrections.

Added to the agenda by Eli Stahlhut was discussion of the proposed construction at 34th and Union.

Treasurer's Report by David F. We had a balance of \$415.00. This includes the \$55.00 for the "City Woods" books sold at MOHAI. Relating to the low balance in our bank account, those present voted to pay insurance in installments and find ways to save money on newsletter costs. One suggestion was to find a less expensive paper. Another proposal was to get more business ads and make sure ads are paid for. A Café Flora person will aid us in doing this, but we will keep our own records. Also suggested that we get volunteers to hand deliver to different blocks.

Members present agreed to send an e-mail message to City Councilwoman Pageler about our hesitation to support cutting trees in the Cedar River watershed.

Eric Stroschein represented the "Yes on Medic 1" campaign and Aaron Ostrom represented "Schools First". We appreciated the information and their dedication of time to get these two important issues on the February 3rd ballot.

Jerry Sussman presented the proposed revised copy of the GMVCC bylaws. Corrections were made by the members present. A motion was passed directing that the proposed bylaws be published in the next newsletter and voted on at the next meeting.

There was a short discussion on what we might want to do about the increasing airplane noise. Peggy Sussman will get more information and possibly speakers for the March general meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 9:10pm.
