ROVERS

Thierry Rautureau, award winning chef-owner of Rovers at 2808 E. Madison grew up in the Muscadset Region of France in the town of Saint Hilaire de Loulay. His parents were farmers and cooked only what they grew. As the oldest child he was given the choice of doing the 'prep' for dinner. At age 14, he started a cooking apprenticeship in Anjou, France and by age 20 he already had 6 years of traditional French training behind him. He then took his professional experience to Chicago for 3 years and to L.A. for 5 years.

On a visit to Seattle in 1987 he happened to dine at Rovers and discovered the restaurant was for sale. And so it came about.


Rovers is an intimate little restaurant nestled in a private courtyard filled with art and warm sophistication, the signature of chef Thierry Rautureau.

His cooking philosophy "starts with freshness and continues with treating all ingredients with attention." He identifies it as "Northwest contemporary with a French accent."

Over the last ten years that Rautureau has owned Rovers, both he and the restaurant have received local and national recognition. He's been nominated twice by the James Beard Foundation as the Best Chef of the Pacific Northwest.

Thierry has been featured on the PBS series titled "French Fest" and has also appeared on the Discovery Channel.

Thierry and Rovers are certainly a great addition to the Greater Madison Valley community.



METRO BUS ON MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. WAY

Plans are in the works to extend the # 8 bus route from 15th Ave. E. and E. Thomas to Madison and MLK Jr. Way, down MLK to S. Jackson, and up to 23rd Ave. E.

This will provide more direct connections between the Central Area and the Broadway shopping district on Capitol Hill, the Promenade 23 shopping center in the Central Area, employment in the South Lake Union area, and Seattle Center, with potential connections in the future to RTA light rail stations on Capitol Hill and the Rainier Valley.

RECIPE of the MONTH

GERMAN-STYLE POTATO SALAD

4 med potatoes

4 slices bacon

1/2 c. chopped onion

1 Tbls. flour

1 Tbls. sugar

3/4 tsp salt

1/2 tsp celery seed

1/8 tsp pepper

1/2 c. water

1/4 c. vinegar

Boil potatoes till tender, drain and cool slightly. Peel and slice potatoes Set aside while preparing dressing.

In large skillet fry bacon till crisp. drain and crumble bacon, reserving 2 Tbls of drippings in skillet, add onions, cook till tender. Stir in flour, sugar, salt, pepper, celery seed. then stir in water and vinegar. Cook till thickened and bubbly. Pour over potatoes, add crumbled bacon and mix gently, best served warm or reheated in microwave, but is just as good cold.


