Restoration Work Begins in the Harrison Ridge Greenbelt

We received over 20 applications from teenagers to work in our Harrison Ridge Greenbelt. We conducted interviews June 30 and July 1, and have selected a crew of 14-to-17-year-old grounds workers, who will clear ivy off trees and open up sites for tree planting throughout the summer.

As we go to press, work is slated to begin July 13, after an instruction and safety orientation session July 11. Our landscape designer will explain basic botany of these woods: plant identification, habits of various species, and why some are undesirable and should be controlled.

We are calling on the many neighbors who have volunteered to help with supervision of the work crews and the work itself. Volunteers may be asked to bring a rake or shovel and to be present for a work shift of three to four hours.

We need volunteers to give us specific dates they would be available, so we can let the teenagers know when they should come to work. Volunteers, especially supervisors, are needed from July through September.

We are really excited to get started on this project, which we have been planning since last year! Please join us in rebuilding a vital urban forest.

Seattle's Comprehensive Plan Update

Seattle's new Comprehensive Plan is scheduled to be adopted by the City Council in August, 1994. The Comprehensive Plan will accommodate the provisions of Washington State's Growth Management Act and aspects of Mayor Norm Rice's proposed "Urban Village" Comprehensive Plan.

Nearby, parts of the Capitol Hill neighborhood and a neighborhood designated as South Jackson and 23rd South appear slated for some changes.

Informational meetings have been ongoing in June and July. The City Council will take final votes on amendments **Monday July 18** at 3 p.m. in the City Council Chambers (11th floor, Municipal Building, 600 - 4th Avenue).

Community Friendship Wall Rises

If you have not visited the Martin Luther King School playground since the tile project went up, it is a sight to behold. At 32nd Ave. E. and E. Harrison, the tile wall is an easy destination for an evening walk; and it will take many enjoyable visits to become familiar with all the children's art displayed there.

The tile project — or Community Friendship Wall — is the product of many people's labor and the creativity of hundreds of children and several adults. Each child from MLK and Bush Elementary schools produced a hand-painted tile and laid it onto a square foot piece of wonderboard, framing it in mosaic pieces that the children themselves smashed out of whole color tiles. This was accomplished during an incredibly intensive week up on the courtyard by the Bush School art studio.

Art department head Laurie Hall and art teacher Bill Baber directed the week's work and kept things moving at an amazing pace. Most of the actual teaching and supervision of the children came from 14 upper school Bush students, who passed up sailing, fishing, and drama to work relentlessly on the tile project during their special activity (AMP) week. They worked hard and were proud when the project was completed.

Bush elementary school teachers Ruth Huschley and Lynn Englesby also threw themselves and their classes wholeheartedly into the project. MLK teachers joined in the fun when they brought their classes up to the tile production area.

The installation was another big effort — so big we could not do it as scheduled. Finally, a date was set, materials were secured and volunteers were called. The pattern and configuration of the installation were largely created spontaneously by several volunteers. This creative activity took shape under the artistic guidance of Roy Sahali, the African-American artist from C.A.M.P. who came to help lay out the tiles.

Once we knew what we were doing, the crew went to work with amazing energy under the reliable and humorous direction of Danny Taiariol, our resident tile man, and Art Huffine. Each section was done faster than the one before, even in the rain; and no one could believe that by 4 p.m. all 70 feet of wall had been covered!

But what about the Arts? For all of us. Well,


finally!
