The laborious first phase of the Greenbelt Restoration Project ended August 31. Twenty young people from central and south Seattle came for eight weeks to slog and chop their way through the thorny underbrush.

Our safety record is spotless, and neighbors have stopped by to offer encouragement, and on several occasions, refreshments!

### **Council Action Update**






Please tell us if your name belongs on this list and we will make amends in the next issue.

In September city crews will remove snags and dangerous limbs with power saws. Our budgeted amount of \$2500 for purchasing native trees and shrubs has been supplemented by the Parks Department (an additional \$3000) and they are masterminding the purchasing process.

Volunteers are needed to form planting parties on weekends in October. We hope to entice some of the young people back for this work as well. Planting will continue if necessary through November.

With a lot of hard work and dedication, our hopes for a revived native woodland are slowly taking shape.
