The Harrison - Denny Community Council is looking for a few good people who would be willing to loan the community treasury anywhere between \$100 and \$5000 to help us establish some "working capital."


Over the last year, we have received approximately \$40,000 in grants from the city and the state to conduct our community organizing campaign and to open the Before and After Program at Martin Luther King School.

There is only one catch! We have to front the money ourselves each month out of our treasury and apply for reimbursement every month from both the city and the state. The amount of monthly expenses exceeds the amount we have in the treasury each month until the reimbursement checks arrive. And, true to bureaucratic form, the checks are usually late.

That's why we are looking for neighbors who are willing to loan the community council the equivalent of one month's expenses. We're looking for 12 month loans, and are willing to negotiate on interest rates(preferably below market rates). We're going to call these "Harrison-Denny Bonds".










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
