

## **Cleanscapes Neighborhood Rewards Project Revoked**

The following press release was issued by Cleanscapes Water Diversion Project Manager, Candy Castellanos, in late April. Upon reading it I was shocked to learn that Cleanscapes has revoked the \$50,000 Waste Reduction Award bestowed on Madison Valley in late 2010, in which Cleanscapes pledged to install new play equipment at the Washington Park Playfields. In December Cleanscapes announced the award to the Madison area community, with construction scheduled to begin this past April. However, in the ensuing months both Cleanscapes and the Seattle Parks Department have remained silent on the project status, and the existing swing-set remained in place, never deinstalled in February as indicated. Then Cleanscapes released this statement on April 25th, 2011:

#### To our customers and neighbors,

Over the last six months CleanScapes has worked through a design review, planning and implementation process with the Seattle Parks Department on the proposed play structure at Washington Park. This playground was the first choice project selected by a community committee for the <u>\$50,000 Neighborhood Waste Reduction Reward</u> prize for the 2009/10 competition. In total, the committee ranked the five eligible projects proposed by the Seattle community:

- 1. New Playground at Washington Park
- 2. Historic and directional bronze sidewalk art in Madrona
- 3. New path & information kiosk at Montlake Gateway Park
- 4. SDOT information kiosk on First Hill (at 9th & Madison)
- 5. Madison Park stairway rails (safety improvement)

In February, Seattle Parks determined that the original proposal would not be approved, as they did not want the swings removed from the existing containment area to make way for a new playground structure.

Seattle Parks suggested to CleanScapes that Parks could expand the existing play area and install a containment curb into which Clean-Scapes could install the proposed play equipment. Prior to this work commencing, however, soils testing revealed un-compacted landfill soils. It was determined that construction issues around these test results would expand the project's scope of work and cost well beyond the reach of the \$50,000 project budget, even... Cont'd on p. 6

## Flooding Along 32nd Ave Fixed By Cathy Nunneley

We are thrilled to announce that after much effort on the part of several neighbors, the flooding along 32<sup>nd</sup> Ave E and E. Denny, near the Harrison Ridge Greenbelt clearing, has been addressed. SPU representatives determined that the constant stream of water, estimated to be 1 gallon/minute across the sidewalk and into the street, was due to a broken inlet. SPU notified Seattle Parks about the situation, as the Greenbelt is part of the Parks system. The swale, located on the northern border of the clearing, was easily repaired and the water is now flowing into the waste water system under the street. Motorists, pedestrians and adjacent neighbors can now enjoy a safer street.

This type of community activism gets results. If you have a problem near your home, don't hesitate to contact your GMVCC for assistance. When we work together, it's possible to accomplish great things for our neighborhood.

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**East Madison St. Fire Station** — This historic photo of Fire Station 34 and the landscape of 32nd Ave. East is hardly recognizable today. This photo was taken in 1927 by the Seattle Engineering Dept. The old wooden structure was completely replaced in 1970 with the modern brick building that now sits at 633 32nd Ave East (see upper left, page two). Today 32nd Ave. is a shady residential street lined with a mature canopy of trees and a mix of contemporary and historic homes. Station 34 houses one engine company and a hose wagon. In the next 3 years the station will undergo seismic retrofitting to meet current earthquake standards and to add a new training area. At this time, CleanScapes will begin a new process with the Seattle Department of Transportation to review the next slate of projects and determine which can be implemented within the \$50,000 project budget. We would like to share our sincere thanks to everyone in the community who worked on the Washington Park play structure project, namely the project proposers - Ann McCurdy and Michelle McKelvey and the many families who attended the public meeting. As we move forward with the other proposed projects, we will keep the community informed with status updates and outreach.

CleanScapes is still fully committed to providing the neighborhood with a \$50,000 project!

This stunning reversal leaves Madison Valley residents with a very sour taste in their mouths and wondering which neighborhood is going to receive the \$50,000 reward project now, as it won't likely to be ours. While initial community reaction to the award was positive, people were concerned to see a design proposal that permanently removed the only set of swings located within a mile radius of the neighborhood. Their concerns are valid, because although Madison Valley has numerous small, quaint "pocket parks" tucked along its slopes, none of them offers swings — the only current set is located at Washington Park Playfields.

One key factor of the Parks Dept's decision to leave the swings in place has not been reported: when Cleanscapes first presented the winning project design to the City Council back in December 2010, several council members questioned the lack of swings in the design and said that, at a minimum, they needed to include a "yellow swing" in the new play equipment. "Yellow swings" are a feature added to traditional swing-sets, which allow physicallychallenged children the opportunity to participate at the playground by swinging in a large, bucket-shaped yellow chair with seatbelt safety restraints.

Cleanscapes decision not to re-work their original design to include a yellow swing component, or any swings in the playground simply doesn't make sense. The existing, contained play area should be big enough to accommodate a more versatile design with activities for every child, of every age and ability. This would simply require a revised, more modest equipment design that includes a couple of swings within the existing footprint.
