Madison Valley Wins Play Structure

CleanScapes has announced that the winners of their 2009 CleanScapes \$50,000 community improvement project are... Ann McCurdy (me!) and Michelle McKelvey. CleanScapes solicited proposals from the community, and Ann and Michelle independently proposed building a play structure at the site of the current swing set in Washington Park, at the south end of the Arboretum. The play structure proposal was almost taken out of the running because it appeared it would exceed the \$50,000 budget maximum. But CleanScapes, excited about the project, worked with city departments and play structure manufacturers to keep the costs within budget.

Plans would have the structure installed early this spring in 2011, with CleanScapes planning a two-day installation volunteer party. See page 6 for their proposed design. As soon as they have an installation date set, they will be looking for volunteers to help put the play structure together. "It should be a great event!" says Candy Castellanos, CleanScapes Waste Diversion Project Manager.

Perhaps not surprising these days, installing play structures is expensive. The proposal could only stay within budget by removing the existing swings and installing the structure in its place, since the area below the swings is already sited and prepped as a play area. To expand the play area would vastly increase expenses as the land would have to be surveyed for drainage and filled with the proper material for kids to safely run, jump, and fall on as they play. Treasurer's Report: Closing balance: \$7,283.52

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Free the Trees!

The Friends of the Greenbelt have been hard at work this fall. We had another work party in November and added a few more gardeners to our ranks. We plan monthly work parties throughout the year. Announcements of work weekend dates will be made on the Madison Valley Yahoo group email. Additionally, interested neighbors may contact us directly to be added to our email group and garner more information. The Friends have two primary goals. Firstly, to remove the vines such as blackberry, ivy, and clematis that are strangling the trees and secondly, to remove invasive plants like holly and deadly nightshade that threaten our native plants. We are working with the Green Seattle Partnership and are applying for the UW REN project. The UW project will assign us a graduate student and, with faculty assistance, will help with the revitalization of the space as well as to formulate a long-term plan.

The greenbelt is a vital part of our neighborhood. It is a continuation of the Arboretum natural corridor that hosts a variety of resident and migratory birds as it links habitats for wildlife. Long time resident Jerry Sussman once spotted 25 turkey vultures among the trees! He and other neighbors have also observed a Great Horned Owl, Band-tailed Pigeons, Pileated Woodpeckers, eagles and our state bird, the Goldfinch. Our greenbelt shelters a myriad of birds, from tiny hummingbirds and bushtits to flickers and hawks. The Audubon Society compiled an extensive list in the 1990s.

In addition to the benefits to wildlife, the Greenbelt provides a delightful respite from the urban landscape, promoting livability and vitality to our neighborhood. Please consider participating in this community project! We provide lots of tools and companionship. The Next Work Party for Friends will be held Sunday, February 13th, 11am-3pm.

Public Art Installed at Basin By Seattle Public Utilities

Portland artist Adam Kuby began installation of his artwork at the Stormwater Facility at the end of December. The anticipated timeline of activities is between 2-4 weeks. The Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs' public art program works with SPU to incorporate artwork into utility projects throughout the city. Funded by the 1% for Art Program, the art projects at SPU facilities highlight the work of the utility. Adam Kuby developed site specific artwork for the stormwater basin facility, and for the stormwater tank in Washington Park.

The proposed artwork at the basin incorporates trees and stone in ways that suggest the power and healing ability of nature. A panel comprised of representatives from the Madison Valley neighborhood, city staff and arts community selected Adam Kuby to develop and install artwork at these two sites. The panel selected Kuby based on the strength of his past work, his ability to develop conceptually cohesive artwork, and his interest in the natural environment.



The *Weaving Stones* is a matrix of low stones that inhabit an area of 14x18 ft. One tree is planted in the matrix that will ultimately push the stones around and change the rectilinear pattern into something more organic. In the *Splitting Stones*, (in above photo) clusters of vine maple trees grow up in the cracks of granite slabs that are broken in half. As each tree grows, it pushes apart the slab pieces even more, evoking the raw power of nature colliding with the urban environment.

In *Bowls*, two identical stone bowls sit near a path. One bowl is split into two pieces and is being pushed apart by one tree, portraying nature's ability to break and destroy. The other bowl is broken into two pieces and being pushed back together by two trees, evoking nature's ability to repair and heal over time. Lastly, in *Closing Stone*, one granite cube is broken into two and placed between two trees that will slowly push the cube back together representing nature's ability to repair and heal over time.

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
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

meetings will be scheduled to encourage feedback on the planned structure. The goal for the ribbon cutting for the new playground is April, 2011.

They received only twelve proposals, two of which did not meet their criteria. Of the remaining ten, mine and Michelle's were essentially the same. I had assumed contests such as these were long shots, but now I'm more encouraged than ever to look for contests and grants in the future. Perhaps other community improvements could come our way, just by asking for them.
