New Grant Opportunity

City Offers "Small Sparks" Grants

At our February pancake breakfast, Carolyn Carlson of the Seattle Department of Neighborhoods helped spread the word about a new option for funding fun community projects. In the past, we in Madison Valley have benefited from City matching grants and "small and simple" grants the traffic circle and 27th and Denny was partially funded from this source, and so was the Madison Valley p-patch. And a small and simple grant of approximately \$5,000 helped fund the planning process for the ongoing Washington Park Fieldhouse project.

Carolyn explained that the Department of Neighborhoods came to recognize that not every project sponsor needs a couple thousand dollars — nor wants the paperwork that accompanies a grant of this size. That's why staff at "DON" developed a new kind of grant: "Small Sparks" grants for up to \$250.

The grants provided to date have funded such projects as:

- Weekly neighborhood walks designed plot out good routes that point to neighborhood treasures.
- A village dance fest in West Seattle, where an African dance and music performance generated support for the neighborhood playground project.
- A boat-building day in Ballard, where kids built a small boat and learned about the maritime history of their neighborhood.
- A series of games and other fun activities to help kids learn what to do in an earthquake .

Other project ideas include activities like a community talent show, a quilting bee that tells the story of the neighborhood, or a planting party in a neglected corner lot. Candidate projects should take no more than two months to complete and help build community by bringing neighbors together. Applicants need to submit a simple (one page!) application, and assistance throughout the life of the project is available from City neighborhood coaches.

Mad P-Patch Update

Snap Peas, Children, and Spring

One day prior to Spring, 2002, a day bookended by snowfalls, twenty third graders proceeded from Martin Luther King Jr. Elementary School to the Mad P. The children carried their 80-plus snap pea seedlings that they had grown in their classroom window. The excited children were met by eight adult volunteers and together they transplanted the peas. In two months pea vines will be six feet tall, enveloping the bamboo teepee that supports them. A small entrance in the teepee will give the children access to a hidey-hole.

The students read vegetable and garden stories to the adults, answered riddles, sang garden songs, conducted a scavenger hunt, and laughed. Thus commenced Day One of the Kids' Plot at the Mad P.

The children gardened again on April 2 and will come

back regularly from now until the end of the school year. We joyfully thank the community volunteers, p-patchers, and the children who have worked to make this new garden. The Kids' Plot is still in a building phase and we are looking for volunteers. Garden experience is NOT required; kindness and an appreciation of children is. In addition, "master gardeners" are specially welcome as we would like to use the highly

praised master garden kit in this children's program. If you're available to volunteer, please call Larry at 329-1159.

In other p-patch news, progress has taken shape as work parties have begun developing a french drain to channel the water from the natural springs on the hillside, adding new flowers and trees, and setting up five wire compost bins. Our next work party is Saturday, May 4, starting at 10:00 am The next time the MLK third graders will come to work on the Kids' Plot is Thursday, April 18, at 1:00 pm. We welcome you to come join us then.

Everyone is also welcome simply to visit the Mad P at your convenience. We're at 30th Avenue East and East Mercer, one block north of Republican. Come see the origins of the Kids' Plot and some of the garden ornaments that local businesses and individuals have graciously donated.

In our next report we'll talk about the food we are growing for donation to the local food bank. Gardeners should note that April is a good time to sow peas (by midmonth), radishes, green onions (known also as spring onions or scallions), mustard greens, lettuces, spinach, and more.
